### Message from the Headteacher

I hope you enjoy reading this end of year newsletter.

And what a year it has been! Throughout all the challenges and disruption, two things have always impressed me: the amazing commitment and resilience of the children at James Cambell and your unwavering support for them. It has been a privilege for all of us at the school to work with you and your children throughout this year.

Despite all the challenges, the children have still achieved so much. To pick out just a few achievements:

- the great progress all the younger children in Early Years and Key Stage 1 have made with their phonics and reading;
- the incredible times table results achieved by the children of year 4 – their constant practice means they have scored higher than the borough and national averages; and
- the results of our year 6 children in their tests which were significantly higher than those achieved in previous years. This provides them with an excellent foundation to go forward into their new schools.

I would like to thank you for all the help you have provided the children at home in making this progress, not least from January to March when the school was closed to most children.

Since returning to school, the children have been able to enjoy a variety of events and activities, including International Week, Sports Days and the re-introduction of swimming for year 5 children.

The progress made this year means that we can look forward to a successful future and the opportunity to provide all the children of James Cambell with the opportunities they deserve. Most of all, I am looking forward to being able to invite you to events at the school and I am hoping (subject to Covid restrictions) to be able to hold a greeting event early next term so you have the opportunity to meet the teachers from your year group.

Finally, we would all like to say goodbye to the children of year 6 and wish them all the best in the next stage of their education at secondary school. And a special shout out for the children of 6C who unfortunately needed to miss their last days at James Cambell through needing to self-isolate. We know you will all be great in your new schools and we hope you will come back and visit us in the future!

On behalf of all the staff at James Cambell, I wish you all a happy and relaxing summer – and look forward to seeing you on Thursday  $2^{\rm nd}$  September 2021.

### Parent survey results: your views matter!



Thank you to everyone who completed the recent parent survey and gave us your views on what you think the school does well and how we can improve.

Here are some of the results:

- 97% of parents said that their child felt happy at school
- 90% said that the school had high expectations of their child
- 95% said that their child does well at the school
- 92% said that there was a good range of subjects available at the school
- 82% said that they would recommend the school to another parent

There are obviously ways we can improve and we are aiming for 100% of parents wanting to recommend the school to other parents. Here are a few of the suggestions that we are now taking forward:

- Some of you said that you would like the school to provide more clubs. As well as the after school and breakfast clubs, next year we will be providing a range of other clubs – you will have already seen a letter about some sports clubs and we will provide you with details of other opportunities in September.
- We will be running more events and workshops to which parents are invited.
- We are looking to improve play times so that there is more for the children to do. You can see our plans for equipment in Key Stage 1 in this newsletter; in addition, we are working on a project called OPAL to enhance the activities available to children at playtimes.

### **Year 6 Careers Week**



During Careers Week, the children of year 6 had an amazing time listening to different speakers talk about their careers.

We had a journalist, a neurologist, a TV producer, an accountant and a solicitor visit the school and we are very grateful to them for giving up their time to speak to the children.

It made the children really think about what career they would choose when they grow up and all the opportunities that could be available for them after leaving school.

Here are some of the comments from the children:

"I wanted to become an accountant after listening to the talk because I'm good with numbers and, I now know that it's interesting - it's something I would like to do when I grow up." Kajani

## Speak Out Stay Safe Assemblies - NSPCC



In the week beginning 5th July all classes took part in the NSPCC Speak out and Stay Safe Virtual assemblies.

These were designed specifically for Key Stage 1 and 2 children and took place in classes.

The purpose of the assemblies was to highlight what children should do if they feel worried or scared about something. The assembly reminds children that things have been harder this last year due to being in and out of school, being in different classes or not being able to do some of the things they did before.

The last year has led to some children feeling worried and unhappy or scared screed and they need to know what their rights are: to speak out and be heard, to be safe and to get help when they need it. Using an illustrated story it showed children how telling an adult in school can help improve things for them.



### **International Week**

This half term we celebrated International Week. We enjoyed learning about the different cultures within our school. As part of the celebration, different year groups decorated their classrooms with flags, learned songs and dances from other countries - and some children even showed off clothing from their own cultures in a fashion show! At James Cambell we are lucky and very proud to have such a diverse community!









### Year 5 visit Jo Richardson to see 'Wonderland'

Jo Richardson Community School invited the Year 5 students to attend a matinee performance of their production "Wonderland" based on Lewis Carroll's *Alice in Wonderland*. It was an excellent performance combining drama with dance and singing. It was superb to see so many of our ex-pupils thriving.

All the children were really buzzing with excitement after the performance. "I didn't think I was going to enjoy it but it was great" and "better than watching a film" were just two of their comments!

At the end of the day we tasted our soup and bread. It was delicious - a lovely end to a lovely day!



# Moving to secondary school in September 2022

### If your child was born between 1 September 2010 and 31 August 2011

This move is not an automatic process. You will need to apply online for a place at the secondary-phase schools you would like your child to go to if they were born between the dates shown above.

Apply online from 1 September 2021 and the closing date for all applications is 31 October 2021.

- Look out for our 'quick guide', which your child's Barking and Dagenham school will give you the first week your child returns in September.
- The admissions process is explained in full within the e-booklet 'Moving to secondary school in 2022' which will be available on our website from 1 September 2021.
- Find out what our 12 secondary-phase schools have to offer at their open evenings or mornings. Due to the social-distancing rules in place because of the Covid-19 pandemic, please book your tour in advance online. Links will be available from each school's website from 1 September 2021. You may have a long wait if you do not pre-register.
- Watch our presentation about the admissions process on YouTube. The presentation gives you important information about applying for a place at a secondary-phase school and is available on our website.
