Outdoor Play

At James Cambell, we strongly believe that outdoor play is crucial for children's development, offering a wealth of benefits. The school is the proud holder of an OPAL (Outdoor Play and Learning) Gold Award.

Let's explore why it matters:

- 1. Physical Skills and Strength:
 - Outdoor play allows children to develop essential physical abilities such as gross motor skills, coordination, and balance.
 - Activities like jumping, climbing, cycling, skating, and team sports are easier to practice outdoors than at home or in structured indoor environments.
- 2. Autonomy and Decision-Making:
 - Unstructured outdoor play empowers children to direct their own activities, fostering independence and d ecision-making.
 - Unlike structured indoor play, the unpredictability of natural environments encourages creative problem-solving.

3. Creativity and Imagination:

- In unfamiliar outdoor spaces, children must think creatively about play.
- Whether using new play equipment or climbing trees, they invent games that make use of the environment, stimulating their imagination.
- 4. Cooperation and Social Skills:
 - When playing with others, children learn cooperation.
 - They work together to decide on games or share the space, enhancing their social skills.
- 5. Knowledge and Connection to Nature:
 - Being in a natural environment teaches children about the world around them.
 - Exposure to plants, animals, and sunshine enriches their understanding of the environment.
- 6. Risk Management and Confidence:
 - While caregivers aim to protect children from all risks, navigating minor risks outdoors is essential.
 - <u>Learning how to handle</u> <u>different situations increases</u> confidence and resilience.

Outdoor play not only contributes to physical health but also supports mental well-being. It provides opportunities for making friends, exploring nature, and fostering a love for learning. Encouraging outdoor play is vital for children's holistic development







New Mulqueen and Nelson Halls
