- Supporting staff with high-quality professional development



SEND update




This half term's SEND section of the newsletter is all about adaptive teaching. We hope you find the information useful. If you have any questions, please contact Ms Thompson who will be willing to discuss anything with you.

What is Adaptive Teaching?

You may have previous heard the words differentiation or scaffolding used when discussing the support your child receives in their classroom/school. The new terminology that is being used is 'Adaptive Teaching'.

Adaptive teaching is a technique that enables all pupils in a class—regardless of their ability- to learn together and aim for the same outcomes. Adaptive teaching increases inclusivity and can boost self-esteem while also recognising that some pupils will need extra support to compete the same work as their peers. Being taken out of lessons, working with a TA on a task, or doing a task which has been differentiated (literally, made different) can all increase feelings of isolation and school anxiety. Including pupils with SEND in whole-classroom teaching and not drawing attention to their different, while still proving support to meet their learning needs is what adaptive teaching is all about.


Reading for Pleasure


I have a few book recommendations for you, that I hope you enjoy:

EYFS:



When a bus driver takes a break in this hilarious Caldecott Honor-winning picture book, he gives the reader just one instruction: "Don't let the pigeon drive the bus!" But, boy, that pigeon tries every trick in the book to get in that driving seat: he whines, wheedles, fibs and flatters. Will you let him drive? Told entirely in speech bubbles, this brilliantly original and funny picture book demands audience participation!

Key Stage 1:




